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My Dear Sister in Christ,

I thank God for the work of your hands. You shepherd, teach, admonish, and encourage. You serve as a faithful witness and in doing so, change women's lives through the love of Christ.

I'd like to introduce you to a woman I hold dear, one whose story is like my own. She may appear guarded when you first meet, but I assure you, she is in desperate need of your grace.

She is the woman who sits behind you in church, with arms wrapped around her children. She stands in front of you at the check-out line, fumbling for change as her baby cries. She is your neighbor, your friend, your sister, your co-worker. But most often, she is the woman with averted eyes, whose story remains unchanged unless someone reaches out to her.

She is the single mother.

I understand your hesitation. With over 10 million single mothers, the task seems overwhelming. Perhaps you worry that ministry to single mothers glorifies divorce. Maybe you feel ill-equipped to minister to a woman whose story is markedly different from yours or to women who are not as far along in their healing.

I urge you to reach out to her. Jesus did. He sought out the woman at the well. He prevented the adulterous woman from being stoned to death. He allowed a sinful woman to wash His feet with tears. He came to heal the brokenhearted. *My broken heart*.

I was that single mother in church with arms wrapped around my girls. A man in front of us held his wife close as the pastor spoke about the sanctity of marriage...

"Husbands, love your wives just as Christ loved the church..." "A cord of three strands is not easily broken..."



Each of you should use whatever gift you have received to serve others, as faithful stewards of God's grace...

-1 Peter 4:10

My oldest daughter looked up at me, helpless in her knowing. Shame fell from my eyes, leaving their watery mark on the pages of my bible. The church, with its four walls, cross, and intact families, increasingly became a house of mirrors, reflecting our isolation and brokenness. In my unseen pain, I found reason to attend less and less.

A woman's leader, like yourself, pulled me back within the protective folds of the church. She had no experience as a single mother. She did not offer financial assistance, food, legal counsel, or a 10-step plan for successful single-parenting. She simply listened. She listened as I poured out my story, in all its shame and wretched truth. She listened to my worry, regret, longing, and doubt. She wrapped her arms around me and spoke of God's love, presence, and forgiveness.

And in that moment, she became the Church as God intended.

Be encouraged. You are the hands and feet of Christ to the single mother, fully equipped to offer grace and hope. Perhaps the Holy Spirit brings to mind a specific woman. Reach out to her. Listen to her story and offer full assurance of God's faithfulness. Let her know she is loved. Seen. Heard. Beheld.

She is not alone.



Developing Community Among Single Mothers is a free, five-week bible study designed to build a strong foundation for small groups of single mothers who desire to grow in community with one another.

Focusing on the purpose and function of community, this study teaches us:

- Our triune God lives in holy community with the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.
- God gave us the gift of community to:
 - Draw us out of isolation and into relationship with God and one another.
 - Provide perspective, wisdom, accountability, support, love, and compassion.
 - Use our collective strength to meet the spiritual and tangible needs of one another.
 - Share our stories in a supportive and encouraging environment.

Once an understanding and sense of community has been established, the group will be in strong position to continue their support of one another through study, prayer, and fellowship. Consider studying <u>The Unseen</u> <u>Companion- God with the Single Mother</u>, also by Michelle Lynn Senters.

MINISTRY TO SINGLE MOTHERS

NEED & PURPOSE

According to the 2021 "<u>America's Families and Living Arrangements</u>" report by the United States Census Bureau, there are 8,765,000 single-mothers caring for over 15,606,000 children, ages 18 and younger. This staggering figure sheds light into what is perhaps the most neglected ministry opportunity in the United States today: the single mother.

Be strong and courageous. Do not be afraid; do not be discouraged, for the LORD your God will be with you wherever you go. -Joshua 1:9

The Christian single mother is not alone, but she feels alone. She often feels overwhelmed and ill-equipped to build a spiritually strong home for her family. Frequently overlooked by the church and society as a whole, the single mother tackles her daily responsibilities with little time to do the things she must, much less the things which might feed and nurture her soul. Prayers are reduced to exhausted one-liners....

God, please help me. Where ARE You in this? I can't do this alone. Do You see me? Do You hear me? Do You even care?

Building a spiritually strong home seems an impossible task to the single mother who defines her family as broken. And the world stands ready to offer counterfeit replacements for the love and stability she and her children long for. But, hope remains because Jesus came to heal the brokenhearted.

Offering such hope to single mothers is no easy task. The well-meaning, but overused phrases, "*All you need is God*" and "*Don't worry, God is with you*" offer little comfort for the single mother who is economically vulnerable, overwhelmed, and lonely. To her, the world seems to provide solutions (co-habitation, remarriage, distractions) that are realistic and within reach.

The purpose of ministry to single mothers is two-fold.

- 1. We offer true hope by embedding God's Word and truth within the heart of the single mother. By embracing His Word and truth, single mothers not only grow in intimacy with the Lord, but they also establish a legacy of faith for her children and her children's children.
- 2. We offer a community of friendship, support, accountability, and wisdom to the often-isolated single mother.

Mission Statement:

With the help of the Holy Spirit, we seek to support, encourage, and equip single mothers through the love, grace, and Word of our Lord Jesus Christ.

BELIEF

As a former single mother and having worked in ministry for single mothers for over seven years, it is my firm conviction that today's single mothers fall within the category of widows found in scripture.

• Our triune God sees, rescues, defends, heals, and loves single mothers.

A father to the fatherless, a defender of widows, is God in His holy dwelling. -Psalm 68:5

I will search for the lost and bring back the strays. I will bind up the injured and strengthen the weak... I will send down showers and season; there will be showers of blessing... They will live in safety, and no one will make them afraid. I will provide for them a land renowned for its crops, and they will no longer be victims of famine in the land or bear the scorn of the nations. -Ezekiel 34:16, 26, 28, 29

• As Christ-followers, we are called to love and support single mothers. We are called to emulate His character and calling.

He has sent me to **bind up** the brokenhearted, to **proclaim** freedom for the captives and **release** from darkness for the prisoners, to **proclaim** the year of the Lord's favor and the day of vengeance of our God, to **comfort** all who mourn, and provide for those who grieve in Zion to **bestow** on them a crown of beauty instead of ashes, the oil of joy instead of mourning, and a garment of praise instead of a spirit of despair. -Isaiah 61:1-3

AM I CALLED TO LEAD?

The thought of "leading" a small group may evoke fear and doubt in even the strongest of believers.

Am I ready to lead? Am I equipped? But I don't know enough about the Bible. I feel uncomfortable praying in front of others. I don't have my own life figured out, much less anyone else's!

Sound familiar? Perhaps a better line of questioning is:

Do I have a heart for single mothers? Do I feel comfortable inviting women into my home regularly? Do I feel a tug or longing in my heart when thinking about this? Am I willing to spiritually grow alongside other women as we learn together? Am I willing to follow the lead of the Holy Spirit?

If you answered "yes" to the above questions, you should pray and ask God if He is asking you to lead a group for single mothers.

Whether you turn to the right or to the left, your ears will hear a voice behind you, saying, "This is the way; walk in it." -Isaiah 30:21



There is no "one right way" to host a community group in your home. Each group is unique and will grow and develop according to the desires, strengths, and needs of the individual members. Before scheduling your first group, consider the following:

- CO-LEADER: Should I lead a group on my own or should I have a co-leader to share responsibilities with?
- LOCATION: Where will the group eat and study? Many group leaders feel extraordinary pressure when it comes to the cleanliness and beauty of their home. Understand that most single mothers offer abundant grace. They understand how difficult it is to manage a home, children, finances, and work. A few dirty dishes in the sink does not disqualify you from leading effectively. Yes, it is important to provide a place that is thoughtfully prepared. Pick up any messes that will distract your members or their children. Make sure the space is safe for younger children (ie. safety plugs, cords hidden, etc.). Consider the aesthetics. Is your home welcoming? Warm? Peaceful? Turn on the outside porch lights. Consider burning a lightly fragranced candle. Play quiet instrumental music in the background. Make sure your pets are safe and well-mannered. Alternatively, some churches may offer a room for you to meet in.
- FREQUENCY OF MEETINGS: The most effective community groups meet on a consistent and predictable basis. Some groups prefer to meet weekly, while others meet every other week. Monthly meetings typically do not offer the level of contact necessary to develop a strong community.
- DATE AND TIME OF MEETINGS: Will your group meet in the evening on weekdays or perhaps in the afternoon on the weekend? Assess the needs of your group to determine the best day of week and time. To allow enough time to socialize, eat, study, and pray, you can expect each group to last 2 2 1/2 hours. Honor one another's time by starting and ending promptly. You may choose to keep your home open to those who wish to continue to pray or chat.
- SIZE OF GROUPS: How many single mothers (and possibly children) can you comfortably accommodate? There is a fine line between cozy and crowded. Groups with 4-6 mothers are most conducive to building community, but you can start a group by simply inviting one woman. Consider:
 - Will your group be open to new guests?
 - If the group grows too large, at what point does it split into two groups? If it splits, who is ready to host the second group? Pray for leaders to rise from within the established community.

- CHILDREN: Most mothers will require childcare. Will mothers need to find a babysitter on their own or will you open your home to children? If children are not allowed, will you make exceptions for breast feeding mothers? If children are welcome, consider where the they will safely eat and play during the meeting. Some groups pitch in financially to pay for a babysitter while other groups simply allow children to remain in close proximity. While still effective, the latter will certainly cause more interruptions during the meeting and may prevent mothers from openly discussing delicate matters. If you allow children, your group may consider having the occasional kid-free meeting to allow for more vulnerability and openness.
- COMMUNICATION: How will you communicate meeting dates, needs, news, food sign-ups, and prayer requests with your group? Email, group texting, and *private* facebook groups are among the most effective methods of communication. Please refer your single mothers to the "SEEN Ministry for Single Mothers" facebook page for events and resources in Colorado Springs, Colorado. If members feel comfortable, share personal emails with one another.
- INITIAL INVITATION: The most powerful way to invite a woman to your community group is through personal interaction, either face-to-face or through a phone call. Then, follow-up with an email or text with all the details. Texting the full address offers a navigation link, which helps decrease nervousness about going to a new place.
- FOLLOW-UP: After the initial "Community Gathering" meeting, follow up with members of your group to let them know how much you appreciate them and their place in the community.
- FOOD: Other than the Holy Spirit, there is no better unifier of human hearts than FOOD! Plan on serving a buffet style snack, lunch, dinner, or dessert each time you meet. While you might take on the first meal yourself, this responsibility should be shared. Give members the opportunity to provide and show off their culinary skills. Allow them to help clean up afterwards. Be sure to publicly praise and thank each person as they contribute. A food sign-up sheet is provided at the end of this manual.
- HANDLING UNCOMFORTABLE SITUATIONS, CONFLICTS, OR DIFFICULT MEMBERS: Decide ahead of time how you will handle problem areas, especially: arguments, unholy conversation or influence, domination of conversation, unanswerable questions, cliques, and rumors or sharing outside the group. Be prepared to step in or mediate, if needed.
- HANDLING ISSUES BEYOND YOUR EXPERTISE OR COMFORT: At some point, you will likely
 hear about a situation that causes concern. Or, a member might approach you with information.
 Understand that you or other members can not solve every problem that arises. It is helpful to know of
 various assistance programs you church and community offers. Consider starting a resource list. In some
 cases, you may need to intervene in safety-related cases. Watch for ongoing abuse, mental illness,
 unhealthy or risky behaviors, suicidal ideation, self-harm, unsafe living conditions, legal issues, financial
 crisis, food shortage, utility or rent issues, etc. As a leader, it is imperative you reach out for counsel on
 these issues.



MEAL: Consider providing a snacks or a meal for this first gathering. Allow women to sign up to bring food to future meetings using the sheet provided. Always accept help cleaning up afterward. This will help establish a culture of gratitude and helpfulness which is essential for a thriving community.

TRADITIONS: Establish traditions within your new community from the first meeting. Consider the following.

- Welcome and Release: How will you welcome women into your home? How will you end each meeting? Physical touch and a verbal expression of gratitude and joy helps create a sense of safety and belonging within the group.
- Prayer: Pray over each meal before you eat, thanking God for His provision of food and friendship. For those mothers who are less experienced with prayer, this offers a strong model to follow as they grow as the spiritual leader of their homes. At the end of each meeting, close with prayer requests and a time of prayer. You can pray a general prayer or specific prayers based on needs for provision, healing, strength, rest, etc. Some groups may prefer to write down specific requests to maintain privacy.
- Gift of God's Word: Before each woman leaves, have her pick a scripture to reflect on until you meet again. Print the attached PDF and cut into individual Bible verses. Place into a basket or jar. Women may share their verses and reflect on the meaning or significance or they may simply choose to bring it home and reflect personally. The goal of this tradition is to create a thirst for God's Word as a source of comfort, wisdom, and peace.

Developing Community Among Single Mothers Session 1: Community Gathering

WELCOME AND FELLOWSHIP TIME:

Welcome mothers and children warmly into you home and establish the "routine" with regards to food, drinks, childcare, etc. Spend time eating and chatting.

INTRODUCTIONS:

- Introduce yourself and share your heart for single mothers.
- Begin your time together with prayer.
- Have mothers introduce themselves to the group with their name, name and ages of children, how long a single mother, work, etc. To encourage steps toward intimacy and openness, as women to answer one of the following questions:
 - What is your greatest hope in joining a community of single mothers?
 - What is your greatest joy in being a mother?

ESTABLISH PROCEDURES AND NORMS:

- Determine preferred communication for group. Pass around the contact list.
- Determine norms for confidentiality, openness, and grace vs. judgement. Ask the members what is necessary for them to feel a sense of closeness and trust. Write down agreed upon norms and review as necessary in subsequent meetings. This document will be used in Session 3.

DISCUSS PURPOSE OF GROUP AND GIVE OVERVIEW:

- Purpose: Single mothers are at high risk of social and spiritual isolation. Using Acts 2:42-47 as a model, the single mother can find support, wisdom, comfort, healing, and companionship in a small community of single mothers. This study is designed to equip community groups with a strong Biblical foundation and a healthy culture of caring for one another.
- Session 1- A Community Gathering: This informal gathering is designed simply to meet one another, share food, and develop new friendships.
- Session 2- The Purpose of Community: In this session, women will learn about God's design for community and the importance of combating isolation with companionship.
- Session 3- The Function of Community: Every member of the community has a powerful and important role. Women will learn how to access their strengths and needs in order to find their place within the community.
- Session 4- Sharing Your Story. Single mothers need to share their story. Women will learn how to share their story and testimony within their community. This session may last a few weeks to give everyone a chance to share.

• Final Session- Celebration and Next Steps. The group will close the study with a celebration, outing, or service project, as determined by the members. If the community group wishes to remain together, they may discuss options for further study.

GROUP DISCUSSION:

Open the discussion up to discuss the needs and hopes of the group. For a structured discussion, ask the following questions:

- Do you feel well-connected or isolated as a single mother?
- What roadblocks to single mothers face when trying to create or sustain friendships?
- What needs do you have in order to feel safe within a community like this?

CLOSING:

- Gift of God's Word: Pass around the basket and allow each woman to take a verse. They may choose to share or keep private.
- Prayer Requests: Ask for prayer requests and end the session in prayer. Some may prefer to be specifically prayed over. Some may choose to write their requests and keep them private.

HOME STUDY:

Encourage women to:

- Connect with one another through the chosen method of communication.
- Reflect on their Bible verse. Pray or journal about it. Memorize it. Mark it in their bible.
- Pray for one another.

Leaders should:

- Pray for each member throughout the week.
- Connect with members occasionally on a personal basis.
- Follow up with prayer requests or concerns, as needed.

• Scriptural Foundation

Therefore, as God's chosen people, holy and dearly loved, clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness and patience. Bear with each other and forgive one another if any of you has a grievance against someone. Forgive as the Lord forgave you. And over all these virtues put on love, which binds them all together in perfect unity. Colossians 3:12-14

• How should we view ourselves and one another? "...as God's chosen people, holy and dearly loved..."

- How should we treat one another? "...with compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness, patience... forgiveness, love, unity."
- Norms: Within a community group, the creation and adherence to norms helps to sustain the vulnerability and authenticity needed to grow and learn. Norms should include the basic principles of respect, dignity, and confidentiality.
- Supporting the Spiritual and Tangible Needs of One Another

"For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in, I needed clothes and you clothed me, I was sick and you looked after me, I was in prison and you came to visit me." "Then the righteous will answer him, 'Lord, when did we see you hungry and feed you, or thirsty and give you something to drink? When did we see you a stranger and invite you in, or needing clothes and clothe you? When did we see you sick or in prison and go to visit you?" "The King will reply, 'Truly I tell you, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me." -Matthew 25:35-40

• Hunger: We are called not only to share food with one another, but also to feed our spiritual hunger for the Word of God.

When your words came, I ate them; they were a joy and my heart's delight. -Jeremiah 15:16

- Thirst: Like the woman at the well, single mothers thirst for the Living Water found in Jesus. *"Whoever drinks the water I give them will never thirst. Indeed, the water I give them will become in them a spring of water welling up to eternal life."* -John 4:14
- Loneliness: Single mothers often feel excluded and alone. By inviting the "stranger" into our group, she feels seen, heard, and loved.

The Lord God said, 'It is not good for man to be alone." -Genesis 2:18

• Clothing: As we clothe one another with grace and love, do not forget the tangible needs among the group.

Suppose a brother or a sister is without clothes and daily food. If one of you says to them, "Go in peace; keep warm and well fed," but does nothing about their physical needs, what good is it? -James 2:17

• Sickness: Many single enter church or a community group as the walking wounded. Be the hands and feet of Jesus to one another.

He heals the brokenhearted and binds up their wounds. -Psalm 147:3

• Prison: Some single mothers feel imprisoned by pain, poverty, and loneliness. Meet her in her place of bondage. Don't wait for her to break the chains herself.

Continue to remember those in prison as if. You were together with them in prison, and those who are mistreated as if you yourselves were suffering. -Hebrews 13:3

• A burden shared is a burden lightened. A joy shared is a joy multiplied.

GROUP DISCUSSION:

- Was there anything you identified with in the video? Disagreed with? Confused you?
- How does viewing one another as "God's chosen people, holy and dearly loved" affect the way in which we interact?
- Review the norms established in Session 1. Does anything need to change as we consider how we should view one another? For example, if we are all "God's chosen people, holy and dearly loved", then:
 - We will treat one another with respect and dignity.
 - We will keep all shared stories confidential.
 - We will care for one another in tangible and spiritual ways.
- Going around in a circle, each member should share one thing they are great at or passionate about. Then, go around the circle again to share one struggle or challenge. Encourage discussions on how one another's skills and strengths can help the group. This activity strengthens our belief that we each have something valuable to offer and we each have needs.

CLOSING:

- Gift of God's Word: Pass around the basket and allow each woman to take a verse. They may choose to share or keep private.
- Prayer Requests: Ask for prayer requests and end the session in prayer. Some may prefer to be specifically prayed over. Some may choose to write their requests and keep them private.

HOME STUDY:

Encourage women to:

- Connect with one another through the chosen method of communication.
- Reflect on their Bible verse. Pray or journal about it. Memorize it. Mark it in their bible.
- Pray for one another.

Leaders should:

- Pray for each member throughout the week.
- Connect with members occasionally on a personal basis.
- Follow up with prayer requests or concerns, as needed.

Developing Community Among Single Mothers Session 4: Telling Our Stories

WELCOME AND FELLOWSHIP TIME:

Welcome mothers and children warmly into you home and establish the "routine" with regards to food, drinks, childcare, etc. Spend time eating and chatting.

TRADITIONS, PROCEDURES, & NORMS:

Continue to establish a sense of community, comfort, and connectedness.

- Honor norms established in Session 1. Revisit, as needed.
- Continue with procedures and traditions to create a predictable and safe environment which is conducive to growth and friendships.

OPENING:

Pray and give an overview of today's session on the purpose of community.

REVIEW OF SESSION 2: The Function of Community

- When we have a proper understanding of ourselves and others as "Gods chosen people, holy and dearly loved", it helps us to value one enough enough to treat each other "...with compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness, patience... forgiveness, love, unity."
- As a community, we adhere to the norms mutually agreed upon. (Review norms, if necessary.)
- As a community, our collective strengths help us to support the spiritual and tangible needs of one another.

TELLING YOUR STORY FIRST:

- One of the most impactful things you can do as a leader is to share your story with vulnerability and the hope of Christ. Sharing our story pulls us out of our momentary trials and concerns. We remember our beginnings and the impact it had on us. We consider all the wonders and joys and struggles of adolescence and the weight of responsibility in adulthood. We dust off our old dreams and wonder why we set them down. We remember how we had it all figured out and then life took us in a completely different direction. When we share our story, old wounds rise to the surface and sometimes bleed again. We find other wounds to be fully healed. When we speak our life into story with a beginning and middle, it forces us to accept there is an end and in that acceptance, we yearn for heights we have not yet reached.
- When preparing your story to share, ask yourself where God was at different stages of your life. How did His presence change, heal, comfort, help, or direct you? Did you always know God or was there a moment of decision? Be sure to share about your relationship with God over the years.
- As a leader, you may not have experience as a single mother. It is important to acknowledge that and share other struggles you may have had. The human experience is wrought with struggle. No one is exempt and there, we find common ground.
- Speaking our truth aloud is powerful experience for both the speaker and the listener. Receive the encouragement, concern, and questions offered after sharing. Through your example of speaking and receiving, you are teaching the members of your group how to look at one's life with a spiritually healthy perspective.

GROUP DISCUSSION:

- As a group, discuss the logistics of each member sharing their story and make a plan. How long will each person have to share? Will anyone share today? Can everyone share in one day or will it take more time? How can we show sensitivity and compassion to one another during this time of vulnerability? Are there any additional norms we need to create so every woman feels heard and validated? Should children be at the home during the sharing of stories or does it need to be a child-free session?
- After everyone has shared their story, make a plan for the Final Session: Celebration and Next Steps. Determine the type of celebration desired. It can be a meal, outing, family activity, or service project. If the community group wishes to remain together, take time to discuss book or study ideas. One option is to read and discuss, "The Unseen Companion- God with the Single Mother" by Michelle Lynn Senters. See the last page of this guide for ordering and discount information.

CLOSING:

- Gift of God's Word: Pass around the basket and allow each woman to take a verse. They may choose to share or keep private.
- Prayer Requests: Ask for prayer requests and end the session in prayer. Some may prefer to be specifically prayed over. Some may choose to write their requests and keep them private.

HOME STUDY:

Encourage women to:

- Think about their story and what they would like to share. Encourage them to question, "Where was God in the midst of this?"
- Connect with one another through the chosen method of communication.
- Reflect on their Bible verse. Pray or journal about it. Memorize it. Mark it in their bible.
- Pray for one another.

Leaders should:

- Pray for each member throughout the week.
- Connect with members occasionally on a personal basis.
- Follow up with prayer requests or concerns, as needed.

This is what the LORD says: "Stand at the crossroads and look; ask for the ancient paths, ask where the good way is, and walk in it, and you will find rest for your souls." —Jeremiah 6:16

STRENGTH

My flesh and my heart may fail, but God is the strength of my heart and my portion forever. —Psalm 73:26 So do not fear, for I am with you; do not be dismayed, for I am your God. I will strengthen you and help you; I will uphold you with my righteous right hand. —Isaiah 41:10

I am not saying this because I am in need, for I have learned to be content whatever the circumstances. I know what it is to be in need, and I know what it is to have plenty. I have learned the secret of being content in any and every situation, whether well fed or hungry, whether living in plenty or in want. I can do all this through him who gives me strength. —Philippians 4:11–13

But we have this treasure in jars of clay to show that this all-surpassing power is from God and not from us. We are hard pressed on every side, but not crushed; perplexed, but not in despair; persecuted, but not abandoned; struck down, but not destroyed. —2 Corinthians 4:7–8

He gives strength to the weary and increases the power of the weak. Even youths grow tired and weary, and young men stumble and fall; but those who hope in the Lord will renew their strength. They will soar on wings like eagles; they will run and not grow weary, they will walk and not be faint. —Psalm 40:29–31

Finally, be strong in the Lord and in his mighty power. —Ephesians 6:10

But he said to me, "My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness." Therefore I will boast all the more gladly about my weaknesses, so that Christ's power may rest on me. That is why, for Christ's sake, I delight in weaknesses, in insults, in hardships, in persecutions, in difficulties. For when I am weak, then I am strong. —2 Corinthians 12:9–10

Be strong and take heart, all you who hope in the LORD. —Psalm 31:24

In repentance and rest is your salvation, in quietness and trust is your strength. —Isaiah 30:15
